
Two tours are planned for the near future.
























IT'S CONCORD ORCHESTRA POPS CONCERT TIME AGAIN. MARK YOUR CALENDARS

'I Think Mr. Ford is Leaving Us'

Henry Ford


• **Born:** 30 July 1863

• Birthplace: Greenfield Township, Michigan

• **Death:** 7 April 1947

• **Best Known As:** Creator of the Ford Motor Company

He was one of the world's most powerful men, but the only light in his home on the night that he died came from candles and kerosene lamps. The only heat was provided by logs burning in the fireplaces. The telephones were dead. Swollen from a torrential Easter Sunday rain, the usually placid Rouge River was on a rampage. The water was eight to ten



feet above its normal crest. Never before had it risen so high. The flood had put out of action the power plant for Fair Lane, Henry Ford's mansion on the river's north bank in Dearborn.

Only three people were in the house on the night of Monday, April 7, 1947. They were Ford himself, his wife, Clara Bryant Ford, and a maid, Rosa Buhler. Ford was 83 and had been in a steady physical decline for three years, but he had insisted that day on seeing the damage caused by the flood.

Ray Dahlinger, his farm superintendent, first drove him to Greenfield Village, where Ford had gathered structures from all over the country that reminded him of the horse-and-buggy America of his youth. The area was dangerously close to the river, but he was happy to find that no real harm had been done. At the Ford Rouge plant he was cheered by finding his giant ore boat, the Henry Ford II, safely in dock from its first spring trip down the Great Lakes.

In midafternoon he rejoined Mrs. Ford at Fair Lane. At dinner he talked over plans for a 100-mile trip-with Dahlinger the next day. Ford said that he wanted to see how the village industry centers at Milan and Flat Rock had fared. But talking made him tired. At 9 p.m. he said good night and went to his bedroom.

At about 11:15, Mrs. Ford heard him calling. She hurried to him, as she always did when Henry called. He told her he didn't feel well. His head ached, he said, and his throat was dry.

Mrs. Ford gave him a glass of water. She sent Miss Buhler to alert Robert Rankin, the family chauffeur, in his living quarters over the garage behind the house, to get a message to the family physician. It took Rankin only a few minutes to drive to the nearest workable telephone, half a mile away at the Ford Engineering Laboratories. He called Dr. John G. Mateer, of Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit, and the oldest grandson, Henry Ford II, at his home in Grosse Pointe Farms.

When Miss Buhler returned to the bedroom, she heard Mrs. Ford say, "Henry, speak to me!" Ford's heavy breathing had stopped. "What do you think of it?" Mrs. Ford asked her. "If only the doctor would come!"

"I think Mr. Ford is leaving us," Miss Buhler said.

Mrs. Ford went to get some warmer clothing. As the maid watched Ford it seemed to her that he tried to fold his hands, as if in prayer, and there was a change in his face. She called to Mrs. Ford. The two

women sat on one bed, watching him. Minutes went by and then Miss Buhler got up and listened to the old man's heart.

"I think he has just passed away," she said.

She was right. When Dr. Mateer arrived 20 minutes later, Ford's heart had stopped beating.

Fate had contrived an ironic touch in putting Ford's death in the setting of the same flickering light by which he had come into the world 83 years before.

What's New for the Model "A"

(From the Ford Service Bulletins)

April 1928

The diameter of the shaft hole in the oil pump body has been increased from 9/16" to 5/8" diameter and the relief removed from the oil pump shaft. When replacing the shaft in an oil pump equipped with the relived shaft be sure to replace it with the same type of shaft, as the present design straight shaft would not allow sufficient area for oil flow when mounted in the previous design pump with the 9/16" shaft hole. The relieved shaft can, however, be used in the present pump with the 5/8" shaft hole.

April 1929

A new headlamp wire clip (A-14598) is available to protect engine pan from cutting the wire. It is held in place by the front hood fastener on the steering gear side. A new Rear Main Bearing Cap is now being used. This cast iron cap is 1 1/8" thick compared to the 9/16" forged cap. New bolts 4 3/16" are now required. The Throttle control assembly has been redesigned from a two piece to a one piece design.

April 1930

A new Generator pulley (A-10130-B) is now being used. This pulley is 9/32" narrower than the old one. When using this pulley on a "BR" armature it will be necessary to insert a special washer next to the face of the pulley to compensate for the difference in thickness between the old and the new. The Radiator baffle has also been redesigned to lessen the loss of water through the overflow pipe. A new Horn bracket is being used because of a change in the headlamp tierod. The new bracket is now 1 1/8" instead of 1" wide.

April 1931

The AA truck wheel disc was changed to incorporate a reinforcing bead around the outside of the hub bolt holes. New truck spring shackles are now being used with the 16 leaf rear spring to lower the loading height of the truck. The new shackle is 4 3/4" vs the old 3 1/2". The gas gauge frame has been changed to include a lug to help keep the gauge in a vertical position. Also a new style metal tire cover is available for the spare tire. the cover consists of a black inner and outer ring with chrome plated molding strips. It was available for \$7.50.

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- Tech Tip -The Gasoline Gauge

Gasoline gauges are built so they register full, "F", when the cork float just touches the top of the tank. With this setting, there will still be a reserve of approximately one gallon in the tank when the gauge registers "O". If the gauge does not register as described, the float wire is bent and it should be readjusted by slightly bending the wire unit the gauge registers accurately.

An easy way to check the gauge is to first remove the gasoline tank filler cap and screen and then insert a wire hook through the filler cap opening and lift up the gauge wire until the float just touches the top of the tank. If it's properly adjusted, the gauge should register full, "F".

Sometimes a gauge wire is so bent that it rubs against the filler screen. When this occurs, the gauge will stick of have a jerky movement, especially noticeable when the tank is being filled. This condition can be corrected by straightening the wire.

Both of these conditions may require removal of the gas gauge to correct, however with the proper tools this can be accomplished in less than thirty minutes.




