35 YEARS AGO --- AUGUST 1970

The August meeting was held at Walter Girds garage in Natick. 12 members attended, exactly half of our total membership. Clyde Kelton was the only one to brave the rain in his Model A. Treasury Balance \$306.94

We had a tour to Amherst N.H. July 26. On a previous tour, Bill McSweeney had bawled everyone out for arriving late at the tour start. This time 6 of us were there but no Bill McSweeney. After a long wait, we decided to start without him but Clyde Kelton thought we had better call Bill's house. Sure enough, he was still there; he thought the tour was next Sunday! The next tour of note will be our sixth Annual Rally on Sept 27.

Our Sept. meeting will be held at Bill Riddell's house in Needham.

25 YEARS AGO --- AUGUST 1980

The August meeting was at Bob Noyes home in Sudbury. There were 18 members & guests but only 5 drove their A's, probably because of the extreme heat. Most of us are spoiled by our Air Conditioned Moderns.

Treasury Balance -- \$543.73

4 A's & 3 moderns made the Pizza & Beer tour July 20th to Papa Gino's on Rt 30.

60 people & 22 A's attended the annual show and Picnic at the Clark's. The prize winners in the club cars show were: Dick Batstone (closed cars); Bud Hicks (open cars); Chuck Danielson (commercial).

For August, we have an ice cream tour planned for the 20th; a tour to Historic Salem on the 24th & an unscheduled Edaville Railroad tour on the 17th. Then it's back to the Grange for the September meeting.

15YEARS AGO --- AUGUST 1990

Fountain Pens: Model "A" Ford Era Fashion Accessory

I collect era fashions and items that qualify as era fashion accessories. Some of my favorite accessories are jewelry, watches, purses, umbrellas, furs and fountain pens. I know that many other era fashion enthusiasts also enhance their enjoyment of our hobby by researching and searching for era fashion accessories.

Our MAFCA Era Fashion Guidelines defines accessories as all non-clothing articles worn or carried pertaining to and necessary in completing the major garment as an ensemble. Examples given are Jewelry, purses, wallets, etc. Many "Additional Limited Accessory Items" are also listed including fountain pens.

Perhaps you have never thought of a fountain pen as a fashion accessory. Certainly it is one of the most utilitarian inventions ever conceived. There was a time, in this country and around the world, when the fountain pen was seen as a highly desirable fashion accessory. Precious metals and gems were sometimes used in their manufacture. Color and style were emphasized along with performance. People purchased pens that reflected their personality, taste and socio-economic status.

During the Model A years scores of pen companies produced an amazing variety of pens. In the United States, Waterman, Parker, Sheaffer, and Wahl-Eversharp were the sales leaders. Less well known were brands such as Esterbrook, Carter, Diamond Point, Webster, Majestic, Waltham, Traveler, Red Dot and others too numerous to list. Fortunately for us, during the Model A years, some of America's best and most famous pens were produced.

Waterman Pens


WATERMAN PEN CO.

L.E. Waterman founded the Waterman Pen Co. in 1881. He is credited with developing the first practical commercial fountain pen. His most famous pens during the Model A era were the Ripple, Patrician and Lady Patricia. The Ripple, a pattern exclusive to Waterman, was his answer to the Parker Duofold. The Patrician, echoing in style the Art Deco movement of the 1920's was a huge success. It came in jet, onyx, turquoise, nacre (pearl and black) and emerald . The Lady Patricia, introduced in 1930, was a dainty, feminine styled pen that appealed to fashion conscious women. Some were customized for their owners to include gem stones.















Tech Tip (Silver Reflectors)

Sulfur in air is the primary cause of tarnish on the headlight reflector. Try this chemical method of cleaning. Gather a plastic or glass container big enough to submerge a reflector and that will withstand boiling water. A one-gallon plastic pail should do. Line the bot-

tom of the container with Aluminum

foil, shiny side up. Add a teaspoonful of salt per gallon of water and boil the water. Poor the solution into the container and stir in a

heaping teaspoonful of baking soda. While this solution is hot, submerge a reflector in it. The tarnish will leave the reflector and

> plate onto the Aluminum foil. Rinse the reflector in plain water (warm) and blow dry it. Do the same for the next reflector. As the Aluminum foil becomes tarnished and the mixture

cools, the cleaning time will increase. Be patient.

JANTZEN KNITTING MILLS

Known primarily for its swimsuits, the Jantzen Knitting Mills are located in Portland, Oregon. John A. Zehntbauer and Carl C. Jantzen founded the company in 1910. It was then called the Portland Knitting Co. and consisted of a retail store and "a few knitting machines on the second floor" where heavy sweaters, woolen hosiery and other articles of clothing were manufactured.

The two partners were intent on expanding their company, especially by means of a product that would give them an edge in the highly competitive knitting industry. Fortunately, a member of a rowing club approached them one day and asked if they could make him a pair of rowing trunks "of a rib stitch." The success of this item led to the company's specialization in the manufacture of swimsuits in the elastic rib stitch. A patent for this suit was granted in 1921.

Carl Jantzen's inventiveness was responsible for the development of an automated circular knitting machine, derivative of hosiery knitting machines, with a fine needle-bed which produced the light-weight material needed for swimsuits. It also reduced the cost of knitting dramatically.

In 1916 the company first used the name Jantzen as a trademark in advertising, and in 1918 they changed the name officially to the Jantzen Knitting Mills. The name was again changed in 1954 to Jantzen Inc.

Early <u>advertising campaigns</u> were aimed at encouraging swimming. One of the longest used slogans was "the Suit that Changed Bathing to Swimming." An idea for a cut-out sticker of a "diving girl' in a red Jantzen suit and knitted cap was reported in a 1923 issue of Men's Wear N.Y. as "proving popular with auto-drivers--[and that] many windshields carry as many as 3 or 4 of the figure." It also became the Jantzen

logo. Billboards were used extensively with artwork by George Petty and McClelland Barclay. Ads in *Life* and *Vogue* in 1921 represented the first national advertising of the bathing suits and established the product as "first class." Before the peak year of 1930, the firm operated factories in Canada, England, and Australia, in addition to exporting to many countries in Europe, South America, and the Phillippines. After the Depression years of 1931-34, a decision was made to license companies in Europe, rather than operating there. The decision was based on the uncertainty of U.S. foreign trade regulations and on the awareness of Zehntbauer, after a trip to Europe, of the political changes taking place there.

What's New for the Model "A"

(From the Ford Service Bulletins)

August 1928

The focus this month was the use of the K R Wilson service tools for the Model A Front and Rear axles. A complete description of the tools and their proper use was detailed. I llustrations showed removing the pinion bearing assembly, seals and replacing bearings and races. (It would sure be nice to have a complete set of those KR Wilson tools). Installing Landau I rons on a business coupe was provided for those customers who wanted to dress up their car. For Trucks, the 7.21 axles have a letter A stamped on the left housing next to the rivets on the bell. The 5.17 ratio has a letter B stamped at the same point.

August 1929

A new ignition wire clip was introduced. It was changed from a forging to a stamping. This has reduced the thickness of the clip and requires a shorter head stud. Three wire clip have been used, the first was 15/16" thick and used a 4 7/16" long stud. The second was 9/16" thick and used a 4 1/16" stud and the final clip is 5/16" thick and uses the 3 11/16" stud. Attention should be paid to the coil. To insure proper operation the coil insulator needs to be kept clean. Signs of dirty coil is a slight miss in the engine. This can lead to constant misfire and eventual cut out. Mechanics were advised to tell customers to keep the coil clean.

August 1930

Ford offered it's new battery (Ford script of course) for only \$7.50, the lowest price ever. Instruction were provided on how to gain proper advance of the distributor. Some mechanic increase the plate lever notch width to increase the travel. This should not be done as the notch has been machine to give 20 degrees of travel. To correct a problem the adjustment should be made at the steering column. Details are shown how to make this adjustment. New items this month included Generator terminal bushings; new steering gear gaskets; and a new steering shaft worm and bearing. New valve springs are now being used. The new spring is 2 15/16" vs the old at 3 7/16" in length. They can be used interchangeably.

August 1931

The De Luxe Coupe rear window has been changed from stationary to one that can be lowered or raised. It is also available as an option for the Standard Coupe. When a rumble seat is installed in a standard coupe the adjustable window will be supplied at no extra cost. Due to the amount of labor required, it is not practical for dealers to replace a stationary window with an adjustable window in old coupes.



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
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
