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
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The Prez Speaks...

Can't wait!


Tips for Winter Car Storage



- 1. Clean the vehicle. Give the car a good wash and wax, if possible, to protect the paint. Vacuum interior areas thoroughly to eliminate crumbs that may attract mice. Wipe down all surfaces, and use a light oil (if the storage area is damp) to protect chrome, cadmium, and unfinished fasteners.
- 2. Change the oil. Your car likes fresh oil. In addition, you may want to oil the cylinders before putting a car away for an extended period.
- 3. Check the antifreeze. Check the antifreeze protection level in the radiator and add or change antifreeze, if appropriate, to a 50/50 mix. Use up to a 70/30 mix if the car will be stored in an unheated area.
- 4. **Stabilize the fuel supply. Fill** the gas tank, and add a fuel stabilizer. The car should be run so that the fuel with the stabilizer reaches the carburetor, and then run with the gal shutoff engaged until the car stalls out. NOTE: It is suggested, alternatively, to consider keeping the gas tank empty (and sealed to prevent condensation) in order to mitigate the possibility of fuel leaks.
- 5. **Grease and Lubricate.** Grease all fittings, and lubricate the hood and door hinges. This will protect against rust and ensure smooth movement next spring.
- 6. **Disconnect the battery.** Remove the battery from the car, if possible, wipe it down and store on a clean dry surface. It may be advisable to use a trickle charger or battery tender. In addition, remove any fuses.
- 7. **Protect against mice.** Place steel wool in the muffler tailpipe, and use "Bounce" fabric softener sheets - or mothballs in plastic cups - to ward off mice and other critters looking to use your car when you are not.
- 8. **Protect the tires.** Check the air pressure and put the car on jack stands or move the car periodically to maintain the tires and protect against flat spots.
- 9. **Protect the top.** Store a convertible with the top up to keep its shape. For cars with hard tops, it is suggested to keep the windows open a crack to allow for some air circulation.
- 10. **Paper the windshield**. Put a piece of paper between the windshield wiper blade and the windshield. You may also want to put a piece of paper between the ignition points.
- 11. **Cover the car**. Cover the car with a breathable car cover, not with plastic, to protect the car. You may want to place a clean sheet of plastic underneath the car to prevent ground moisture and to catch any wayward drips.
- NOTE: These tips were discussed at the Minuteman Club's October meeting; as we saw then, most ev-
- eryone has an opinion on what works best for them. As John Bradley point's out on his website

- ferent and that everyone should think through their own particular situation and make a plan accordingly.

Tech Tip

(Oiling the Trico Vacuum Wiper Motor)

If your wiper is moving very slowly (or not at all) try giving it a shot of oil. A little oil will put new life into the packing. 3-in-1 oil is just right for this application. Attach a short piece of wiper hose 4 or 5 inches to the wiper motor. Start by turning the shaft of the wiper fully to the right. Then move to the left approximately 3/4 of the full travel. Now insert the short hose end into a container with a few teaspoons of oil. Now quickly move the shaft back to the center position. Withdraw the hose and complete the balance of the move to the full right position. This operation puts oil into one side of the motor. Repeat the above, but start off by going to the full left position; return stroke 3/4 of

the way to the right; submerge the hose in oil; quick half stroke to the left; withdraw hose from oil and complete movement to left. This oiling operation should restore the wiping action.

Here's another way. Disconnect the wiper hose at the motor. Take your trusty can of WD-40 and squirt a small amount into the motor. Move the wiper arm slowly. Reconnect your wiper hose and your wiper should work as good as new. You may have to repeat with another squirt of WD-40. This has worked for me...but now I just use Rain-X

BOSTON BAKED BEANS

2 lbs. beans (Navy or Pea Beans)

1 lb. salt pork 8 Tbsp. sugar 2/3 c. molasses 2 tsp. dry mustard

1/2 tsp pepper 4 tsp. salt

1 medium onion

Soak beans overnight in 2 qt bean pot. In morning, parboil for ten minutes with tsp of baking soda. Run cold water through beans in a colander. Dice rind of salt pork in inch squares, cut in half; put half on bottom of bean pot with whole onion. Add beans and rest of pork on top. Mix other ingredients with hot water. Pour over beans. Bake 300 degree oven for six hours. Makes ten full portions. (Occasionally check beans to add enough water necessary to keep beans moist)

What's New for the Model "A"

(From the Ford Service Bulletins)

November 1928

New for this month was the redesign of the front motor mount. The original solid mount, which was part of the front cross member, is being replaced by a flexible support which consists of a yoke and mounting springs. The support is standard on all new cars and can be retrofitted to existing cars. Detailed instructions are provided for this retrofit. A new service brake cross shaft is now standard on all cars and trucks. The new shaft replaces the old style shaft and equalizer assembly, as the old assemble is obsolete and will not be carried for service.

November 1929

To solve some complaints of water leaking in the seam of roof material, dealers we advised to use the Water Repellent Solution (M-1205-B). It is applied to the seam as directed in the instructions. Also changed this month was the wiring at the terminal box. The wiring change is very slight, the ammeter is now in the ignition circuit. This allows the ammeter to register discharge as the engine cranks. This aids in the diagnosis and service of the ignition system. This change can be easily made on exist cars by relocating the black coil to terminal box wire from the right post to the left post in the terminal box.

November 1930

A new truck bumper is now being used. It is a single bar of heavy design and replaces the two bar design. The new bumper is black enamel. A heavy duty front spring is now available for passenger cars. The new 12 leaf, heavy duty spring, is available where vehicle are subjected to exceptionally rough roads. A new tie bolt and spring clips are required with this spring. Also, new 32CP headlamp bulbs have been released through service for use in those states where these bulbs are legal.

The length of the pedal bushings have been changed from 15/16" to 1". This length eliminates the lubrication space between the bushings. A 19/64" hole will need to be drilled in the bushing through the lubricator fitting hole.

November 1931

No service bulletins were issued in November 1931...I guess they were focused on releasing the '32 ford V8.




