




More Super Tour Stuff



Tech Tip

(Brake Light Switch)

Recently, a few of the guys had the opportunity to help Bucky replace the Clutch, Pressure Plate and Flywheel on his 1930 Coupe. The job was straight forward, with all going well, no parts left over. That is until Bucky went for a test drive. The cute little coupe died just down the road. Towing it back to the garage, we found a blown fuse. Before replacing the fuse, we check for shorts, and found a short when the brake was pushed. We figured a new brake switch would solve the problem...NOPE. A check of it showed it also shorted out when the plunger was pushed. We did some checking and found that the

replacement switch was manufactured poorly. The insulator hold the two screws for the electrical wires were shorted where they went through the metal housing. We had to "adjust" the fit here by using a small hammer and punch to physically move the whole insulator assembly. We found a point where there was no short when the switch was actuated. This cured the shorting out problem in the Coupe and Buckeye was on the road again. CAUTION - - If you purchase a new brake light switch, check it for shorts before installing it...this will save you from having to do the job twice.

President's Tour to Fenway Park



The weather could not have been better for our trip to the Back Bay of Boston and environs. It was an absolutely beautiful morning with bright blue skies, low humidity and temperatures in the 70s. We were on a strict schedule, so the main tour group left the Grange parking lot at 10 AM headed for route 9 and Boston. On the way they picked up four Model As in Wellesley and two in Chestnut Hill making a total of twelve (12) As and one modern.

Although there were many traffic lights to deal with along the way, the group made it into Brookline Village by 10:45 AM and made the left hand turn onto Brookline Avenue. We chugged by the Dana Farber building, the Beth Israel Hospital and the old Sears building and then passed the ballpark on the starboard side. We then turned down Landsdown Street hard against the famous left field wall and we parked in an enclosed garage right behind the centerfield bleachers.

The group was then instructed (!) by the tour leader that they were to be in the souvenir shop across the street from Fenway Park by 1 PM for the 1:30 PM tour. Until then, everyone was "on their own" for lunch and shopping. Some ate at the Red Sox cafe on Brookline Avenue called "Game On" while others had lunch at The Boston Beer Works, Uno's or another of the many eateries that are near Fenway.

Fortunately our group of twenty-seven adults and four children was a "private" tour because it was apparent that the regular tours had upwards of one hundred people participating! At 1:30 PM we met our tour guide Bob who explained that he had been a Red Sox fan since his first trip to Fenway Park in 1947. Bob has a wealth of knowledge when it comes to the Sox and the ballpark. We visited the press box first and we got an explanation on just how the electronic scoreboard is controlled and how the writers and reporters watch a game and file their stories. From the press area we moved on to the 406 club and got an even better view than we had from the press box area! All along the way our guide Bob told us all kinds of stories, anecdotes and answered our questions about the ballclub and the ballpark. We then went up to the top of the left field wall and got a chance to sit in the so-called Monster Seats for what many call the best seat in major league baseball. The view from up there was spectacular being 37 feet off the ground (we learned that) with great sight lines to the rest of the park.

The last part of the tour took us down to the front row along the third base line where our guide wrapped up the tour telling us about the field itself, the manual scoreboard in the wall and lots of other interesting trivia. Time seemed to fly by with the tour lasting over an hour!

As we made our way back to the parking garage, some of the children got autographs from some of the players arriving early for the game. Most of the Minuteman tourers left for home by 3:30 PM but a few of use made our way over to the Maparium at the Mary Baker Eddy Museum for a quick tour there.

What's New for the Model "A"

(From the Ford Service Bulletins)

September 1928

Major changes to the carburetor took place this month. The double venturi was replaced by a longer single venturi. Other changes consisted of the addition of a new secondary well in the lower housing from which the idle jet derives its supply. The sizes of the other jets we also changed. The steering sector housing got a new grease fitting to lubricated the shaft. it should be lubricated every 2K mile. The Toe-in adjustment was changed from 3/16" to 1/16" plus or minus 1/32". On the starter, the Abell type drive has been obsoleted and replaced by the Bendix type drive. For the Coupe and Roadsters without rumble seats, a new deck support is now standard. The new support folds at the center.

September 1929

New radiator bolts were issued. These had smaller threaded area so you can't over tighten the nut and spring. There were three types of rear hubs being used. The Shoulder, the Grooved and the Tapered designed. from this point on only the tapered hub will be used and supplied to dealers. A new Spindle locking pin (A-3122C) and bolt(3115-16C) will be used. This new pin holds the spindle bolt more securely. A new gasket is being used in the tank gas cap. The old composition gasket is being replaced by leather. The Water Pump got new split ring packing material, replacing the metallic string. And lastly the price of the Cigar Lighter was reduced from \$1.75 to \$1.25.

September 1930


This month, the bulletins covered the five dump bodies for the AA chassis. Details are given on how to mount the bodies, which included the Heavy Duty Hydraulic; the Light Duty Hydraulic; the Mechanical Rotating Power Hoist; the Gravity Dump and the Hand Hoist dump Body.

September 1931

The retail price of the Ford battery was reduced to \$6.90 with the owners old battery. A new front hub bearing retainer washer was introduced. This washer accommodated the new front hub cap. New hubs are threaded about 3/8" to accept this cap (A-1139). This change was to lessen the possibility lubricant working out around the wheel hub caps. The washers can be used with the old hubs. New brake rod springs are being used. The new round design replaces he flat spring. The new design improves the spring action and increases the strength of the spring.



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
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
